WOW! What an experience I had as part of the 71st General Service Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous. I received a huge amount of support from my fellow delegates, the GSO staff, and Area 54 Panel and my partner, Bob D. Thank you all for "having my back."

The GSO staff was very well prepared and generous with their time. If there was a question, during discussion, the person with the information was available quickly and with complete knowledge or resources. The effort and success of the technology of this conference was amazing. The knowledge and skill of the tech support was good. If you had a problem, they called you to check if they could help.

Before the conference, we had several virtual meetings as a committee and with all the delegates. We learned hands-on how to operate the Zoom technology and "How A Conference Operates" instruction. We were given ample time to ask questions and learn how to update our Zoom so all the tools showed up.

The conference began Saturday April 17th at 11AM and started at 11AM each day. This was 5AM for the delegate from Hawaii (Area 17). We had Committee Meetings prior to the conference to discuss housekeeping and everything other than the agenda items. We started our official committee meetings on Sunday April 18th and the General Service Conference began on Wednesday. We had great presentations and staff reports. It became

The final total of agenda items was 110. The total Committee Recommendations were 47, total Advisory Actions were 49, total Committee Considerations were 89 and we finished with 6 floor actions. We

adjourned the 71st General Service Conference at 2:30 AM Sunday Morning April 25th.

Preamble revision replacing the words "men and women" with "people" will appear in the July issue of Grapevine." and its translation will be in the July/August issue of La Viña. Both of these issues will be mailed, and posted online, on June 15, 2021. After June 15, as new Grapevine, La Viña and A.A.W.S. literature or reprints go to press, and as web pages are updated, the language will change wherever the A.A. Preamble appears."

One of those Floor Actions, which was unanimously passed, was for an updated pamphlet "AA for the Native North American." Our current pamphlet contained racial slurs. It had been banned from use in many areas in Canada and the northern states of the US. The Committee on Literature could not finish their agenda items and this was one of those 6 items forwarded to 2022. The delegates from the NW US and Canada brought this Floor Action. By a unanimous vote the following was passed. "The pamphlet "A.A. for the Native North American" be updated to include language that is both respectful and inclusive of all Indigenous peoples as well as

add fresh stories and update inaccuracies contained in the current pamphlet...."

I would like to share that a majority of the Fellowship requested the Grapevine Board, who owns and publishes the Preamble, address the need to change it to gender neutral language. Two different suggestions were proposed in 2 Floor Actions. The main argument for the change is paraphrased as follows: 'When the Preamble is used in the opening of AA meetings, if just one person is offended and

“Return to Forever”

As we approach a post-COVID reality, sort of a return to what we once knew as life, the expression crossed my mind, “Return to Forever.” For the jazz *aficionadi* among us, that expression will be recognized as the name of a band that emerged back in the ‘70s. The recently deceased jazz legend who was the founder of that group once said,

The poetic thought behind [that title] was that in music and in art in general, when one puts their attention on creativity, what you're doing is returning to a very natural home ground of yourself, of the spirit, of something that everyone has in common.

I'm always trying to communicate from that place and return to it. You get into the survival aspects of your life and you can forget about that easily, so that was like a reminder: return to forever.

Chick's profound thought goes beyond music and art in general as well as putting our attention to creativity. It has relevance to those of us who “have recovered from a seemingly hopeless state of mind and body” – the state we know as active alcoholism. That is not the “forever” to which we wish to return. Yet, the memory of that “forever” must stand as a constant reminder of “what it was like.” We must not regret that past, nor wish to shut the door on it.

We must also return to a place from which we are “always trying to communicate,” as Corea said. It is, after all, a place of the spirit, of something that we all have in common. That place, we thought, was a place of comfort - perhaps a home group that had been “shut down” for over a year, or an opportunity to share at a treatment facility, or participation in-person at a general service assembly. We may have felt comfortable because of familiarity of physical surroundings and people.

But there is an “inner place” that has no physical boundaries or friendly smiles, hugs and hand shakes. That is a spiritual place from within. That is the forever to which we must return.

For many of us, the pandemic exposed our lack of grounding in that inner spiritual place. We had no “forever” to which we could return, and we felt lost. Now that we are on the verge of returning to the physical place that we thought was our forever space, we should understand that nothing physical is forever. So let us return to a forever that no human or virus can remove, a space that does not need a chairperson or a secretary or a treasurer, or even a “lead.” They are all people. We must not forget the second and third of those “three pertinent ideas” that became clear to us as we read our Big Book and shared our stories: “that probably no human power could have relieved our alcoholism, and that God could and would if He were sought.”

Let us remember that when we get into the survival aspects of life, we can forget about our true forever space. Having survived COVID-19 let us now go back to the solemnity of our inner space. But we must also remember that we cannot return to a place we were never in. Fellowship is great, and it has an important place not just in recovery, but also in each of our three legacies. However, people come and go, and buildings close. Then what? Then we must go to the inner space, the spiritual place. We must “Return to Forever.”

leaves AA, we are not being responsible to that one person who reaches out for help.'

The 2022 GSC Theme is: "AA Comes of Age 2.0: Unified in Love and Service."

Here are few items we vigorously discussed here in Area 54:

- Committee on Corrections to make revisions to AAWS literature directed to members behind the walls removing terms "inmate" and "offender" replaced with "person in custody."
- Grapevine Board to implement Instagram Account.
- The pamphlet "AA for the Black and African-American Alcoholic" be updated to include fresh stories and a new title that is respectful and inclusive.
- Fourth Edition of the book, *Alcoholicos Anonimos* (Spanish) be developed, including updated of stories to reflect current membership.
- Draft version of the book *Alcoholics Anonymous* (Fourth Edition), be translated into plain and simple language and be developed in a way that is accessible and relatable to the widest audience possible.
- A Committee Consideration also on the Fourth Edition. Committee on Literature to address and to find a common solution for: plain language, simplified language, accessible translations and large print versions of the book, *Alcoholics Anonymous* as well as workbooks to help study the program of AA.
- A Fifth Edition of the Big Book, *Alcoholics Anonymous*, be developed including an update of stories to better reflect current membership, keeping in mind the 1995 Advisory Action that: "The first 164 pages of the Big Book *Alcoholics Anonymous*, the Preface, the Forewords, 'The Doctor's Opinion,' 'Dr. Bob's Nightmare,' and the Appendices remain as is," and a progress report be brought back to the 2022 Conference Committee on Literature. Pending its development, the draft Fifth Edition of the Big Book would include a new foreword, an updated preface and updates to expand on existing ideas in Appendices III and V.

The US/Canada General Service Structure recognize online groups, and encourage their participation, listing those groups who ask to be listed within the group's preferred district and area, with the default option being the location of the group's primary contact. This supersedes the 1997 Advisory Action that designated online groups as "International Correspondence Meetings."

In general, all committees with workbooks were given lists of items to change, update and include in the workbooks. Also, a majority of the committees asked that the workbooks be available electronically or digitally and portions in video format. Service material was repeatedly asked to be available electronically. In addition, video format was requested when possible.

It was requested that all our literature and service material to be reviewed for diversity and accessibility and updated to reflect our current membership. On the financial horizon, the Fellowship was profoundly thanked for their actions to increase the 7th tradition contributions to a record amount in 2020. With the reduction in expenses, the 2020 year ended much better than expected.

GSO electronically upgraded the staff so that they could work from home and the staff completed an amazing amount of work in 2020. GSO office is opening slowly and conforming to New York State Guidelines and other local and property guidelines. GSO will not be able to accept visitors for now.

The details of the 71st General Service Conference will be in the Final Report. This is to be release electronically and in print. I hope to get authorization from GSO to put on the website several reports that I have.

The ERP (our software data system) has successfully combine the financial and the contributions and the literature sections. I find the purchasing easier and the electronic contribution also easier. The Fellowship Connection portion is progressing. GSO would now like the Registrars to tell them what changes/modifications they need. GSO will then know what the users of this program need and add those items.

In addition, we are using a lockbox system now and saving the cost of 3 full time employees.

Financial Statistics for 2020:

7th Tradition Contributions \$10.26 million, Online Contributions = Individual 42%, Groups 39%, Other 20%,

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Birthday Contributions = Individual 73%, Group 26%, Other 1%. Literature Gross Profit \$6.58 million, Grapevine & La Vina, Average Circulation 68,572, Net Income (Loss) was (\$299 Thousand), General Fund Support of LaVina Service Activity \$386 Thousand. Reserve Fund; Coverage Ratio 7.9 Months.

The 7th Tradition 2020 of \$10.26 million were from 24,779 Groups (34.8%) and Individuals gave \$4,286,383. This is the 2nd consecutive record of 7th Tradition giving.

Costs of services provided to the Fellowship in 2020 was \$10.8 million. Supporting Services 19.1%, Outreach 39.3%, Group Services 26.6%, Service Leadership 15%.

Impact of Pandemic on 7th Tradition:

Group Contributions in 2020 were \$6.0 million, Number of groups contribution was 34.8%. This was 3,401 fewer groups than 2019. Average Group Contribution in 2020 was \$238.95. Individual Contributions in 2020 were \$4.3 million versus \$1.9 million in 2019. Per capita contribution was \$6.81.

Please do not stop your contributions to GSO (NY), to Area 54, and intergroups. With the continued decline in print literature purchases, we as members need to be the financial support for Alcoholics Anonymous.

Here in Northeast Ohio Area 54 our contributions are lower than usual. The first six months of the year are our big spending months. Please ask your groups to send Area 54 what they can spare. All the entities will need more support this year too.

I never thought that though everything was ready when I got there that somebody had to do the work. Somebody had to come early and set up the chairs and make the coffee.

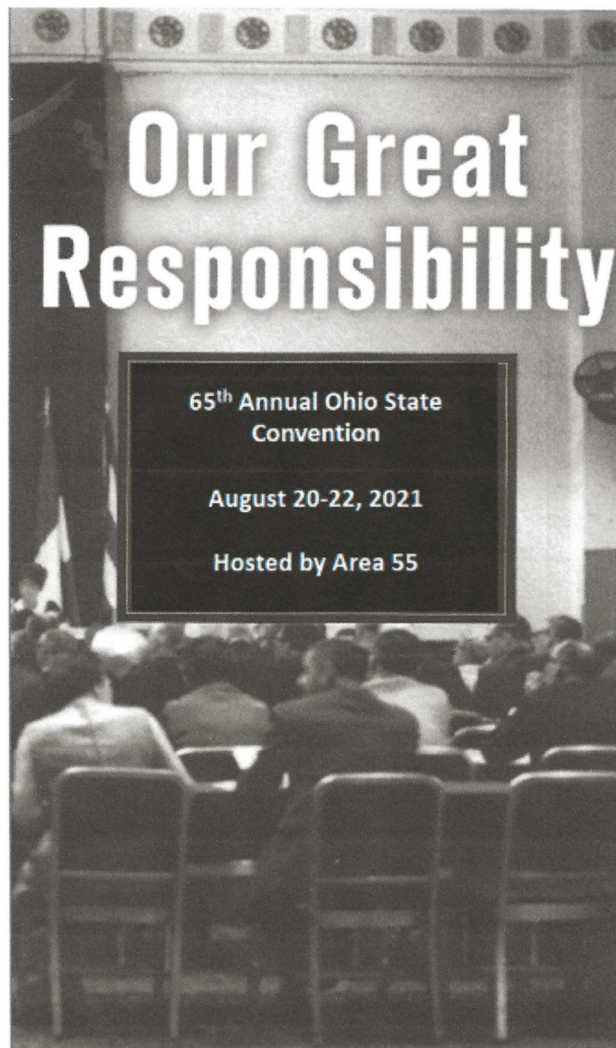
