Several emails have been received about changes to the Grapevine Preamble. There are many statements being made about this advisory action of the 71st Conference. I want to give you the facts. The Grapevine is a separate entity. An editor of the Grapevine wrote the first version of the Preamble (not Bill Wilson) and it has been revised over the years by other Grapevine editors.



The floor actions offered recommendations with wordings suggesting gender-neutral language:

From the Final Report

"FLOOR ACTIONS"

It was recommended that:

1 The A.A. Preamble be changed from: Alcoholics Anonymous is a fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues or fees for A.A. membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions. A.A. is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization, or institution; does not wish to engage in any controversy; neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

To:

In Alcoholics Anonymous we share our experience, strength and hope with each other that we may solve our common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues or fees for A.A. membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions. A.A. is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization or institution; does not wish to

“So, Now What?”

We thought we were approaching the end of COVID – 19 pandemic mode. We were happy: live meetings, summer picnics, family get-togethers, service opportunities, etc., etc. So, what happened? Delta Variant! What’s that? As a relative of a close friend of mine would say “Now what?” They told me when I came to the so-called “rooms,” “this too shall pass.” But the “virus” did not pass; it regrouped and came charging back - sort of like alcoholism in relapse mode. Some say the disease of alcoholism is out in the parking lot “doing push-ups.” Not true! The disease of alcoholism is in my own head “doing push-ups.” The disease of COVID-19 is in the parking lot “doing push-ups, lurking around waiting for the next unsuspecting, unvaccinated, unmasked victim.

People say a lot of things that are not true - about alcoholism and about life. But when I came to General Service you folks told me that part of the job was to disseminate accurate information. In this so-called information age news travels fast, regardless of its accuracy. I guess that makes General Service even more important. Before I made it to General Service you taught me to practice these principles in all my affairs. At the foundation of the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous is honesty. So if I am to practice AA principles in all my affairs, I must practice honesty in all my affairs. Let us be honest! COVID-19 is probably here to stay, just like diabetes in my life, just like measles, like chickenpox, like mumps, like polio, and even like influenza, and like the so-called “common cold” which is actually a non-lethal coronavirus.

Some of the deadly diseases of my childhood have been virtually eradicated. (Maybe some of you are old enough to remember the Salk vaccine - a shot in the arm, and then the Sabin vaccine - given in the sugar cube). And any of us who have raised children in the past 50 years or so know about “baby shots.”

When I got sober, I had to learn to live with the knowledge that I am an alcoholic “for life.” I had to change my way of living and my way of thinking. If I did not adapt to those changes, I would not live. It was a matter of acceptance. It was not easy; I didn’t want to be different. Thus, it should not have been surprising that my drinking career was characterized by “countless vain attempts” to prove I could drink like other people.

Having gone through that experience, we of Alcoholics Anonymous ought to be better positioned than others to deal with COVID-19 and/or its variants, one would think. Oh, but I almost forgot! Those who would “think” that way are probably not alcoholics. Afterall, we have been known to have “thinking problems.”

So, again I ask the question, “Now what?” I have a suggestion that is not likely to be new to those reading this newsletter:

If you have decided you want what we have, and are willing to go to any length to get it - then you are ready to take certain steps. At some of these we balked, we thought we could find an easier, softer way. But we could not. ...

You should recognize this as what I call the Prelude to the Twelve Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous (a.k.a. “How it Works”).

So, now what? Back to basics; that’s what. The alternative could be death.

engage in any controversy; neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

2 The first sentence of the A.A. Preamble be revised with gender-neutral language by replacing the words "men and women" with the word "people" to read: "Alcoholics Anonymous is a fellowship of people who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism."

4 The Preamble revision replacing the words "men and women" with the word "people" be presented to the General Service Board for approval as the new revised A.A. Preamble."

As you can read from the above three floor actions that there were varied opinions of how it should be changed. The Grapevine was under no obligation to accept any of the above recommendations. They were free to ignore these recommendations. The Grapevine is its own entity and has editorial freedom.

The Final Report is available in digital format (pdf). I had hoped to put it on the website. There is a concern about anonymity. If we can solve that problem, I will put it on the website. It is a pdf file with 7128 kb and if you can handle this size file, I will forward to you via email upon request. The Final Report has gone to the publishing house and the print version should be available this fall.

The East Central Regional Forum will be held Virtually November 19 – 21, 2021. Northeast Ohio is one of 14 Areas in the East Central Region. We are participants in this forum. I received an email from the General Service Conference Coordinator asking the **current Area Delegates to select topics and participate as presenters and/or workshop moderators.** There are service opportunities for delegate presentations (scheduled for Friday evening and Saturday morning), as well as openings for moderators of workshops (scheduled for Saturday evening). We received a list of topics.

The letter stated that presentations and workshops are an opportunity for topics of interest to your area and your region to be discussed at this Forum.

Action is required. For a Delegate Presentation: Choose a topic from the list of suggestions, submit the topic to GSO ASAP (before October 18th). If selected, submit Presentation by November 1st.

I would like Area 54 to investigate this opportunity. The panel and past delegates have received the list of topics. Let us talk about this at our next assembly. (If you want a copy of this list, email me at delegate@area54.org.)

We are planning 2022 Calendar of Events. The Mini-Conference will be held in person in March 25 – 27, 2022 at the Radisson Cleveland Airport, North Olmsted. Please plan to attend. This is your opportunity to voice your opinion on the agenda items.

The quarterly report was received from GSO and included progress reports on the revisions and rewrites of the pamphlets "AA for the Native North American", "AA for the Black and African American", "Young People in AA", and a progress on the development of a pamphlet based on the AA's Three Legacies plus many of the items from the 71st Conference. There was a lengthy report on the scope and development of a plain and simple language Big Book and the research of the workbook development.

There was a change by Grapevine in fulfillment centers and that is why some groups' August Grapevines were late.

To the numbers...

Gross literature sales were slightly higher than expected for the first six months of 2021. Contributions were also slightly higher than expected. [Keep up the good work.] The Trustee's Finance and Budgetary Committee expressed gratitude to the Fellowship for the continuing Seventh tradition support. The committee recommended the General Service Board approve an immediate transfer of \$250,000 to the Reserve Fund. The current balance of the Reserve Fund covers 8.41 months of expenses based on the original expense budget for 2021.

Unfortunately, Area 54 is not receiving the contributions we expected to receive. We are tightening our belts on expenses, but I am asking each of you to see if your group can send in a contribution to Area 54. Every dollar is appreciated. This mailing is our biggest expense, and we want to make sure we continue with our mailings. If you can go green and receive this via email, let us know.

Many groups need GSRs and if your group does not have a GSRs please volunteer. We will introduce you at the next Assembly. Just come to the Assembly in person or online. [Any member of AA is welcome to attend the Assemblies, etc.] Thanks for all you for your service work.

TREASURER'S REPORT

It is interesting to me to have this responsibility. When I first stumbled into the rooms we had a number of group treasurers – each of whom would last a month or two and take off with the treasury. At my morning meeting a fellow Alcoholics reminded me of a 12 step call years ago to recover our treasury from a missing treasurer. We did recover the treasury but unfortunately, we lost the

treasurer.

So, I guess this makes sense in my service journey.

As area treasurer for 54, I have the opportunity to serve by directing the funds for our area, from our groups and individual contributors. At our Area Assembly's and events, we usually cover our rent expenses with members who attend the events by passing the basket. This basket on the Area level shows me that AA can pay for itself. I usually have to write a check for \$20 or so to make up the rent difference. The bulk of our contributions come from the groups of Area 54. Every week I go to the PO box in downtown Cleveland and pick up checks and area mail.

AA needs to pay for itself with the funds it generates from the fellowship. During covid we get by on a little less, about 30% less. By cutting back and tightening our belt we are ok. We support our delegate, area officers and committee chairs travel and expenses. We host with seed money and reimbursements to the individuals to attend the national archives and corrections workshops. We have a DCM and GSR school as well as a Gratitude Sunday, Open House picnic and Unity Day events.

As an area, we have saved for over four years to redesign our website, and we are in the final revision stages of this project.

When we do have a year where we exceed our income over our expenses, we historically contribute to GSO.

I learn more about myself as I try to use QuickBooks to keep track of our expenses and budget. I have to thank our former delegates, our current delegate and past treasurer for assisting me in this task. I feel fortunate to be given this opportunity to serve our fellowship.

MESSAGE FROM AN “ELDER STATESPERSON”

12 and 12 and 12

In the Fellowship we are all generally acquainted with the 12 Steps of Alcoholics Anonymous as they are a necessity to recovery. We come to realize that sobriety is more than just putting the cork in the bottle. The 12 steps provide us with a Spiritual Awakening which the “Spiritual Experience” section of the Appendices of our book Alcoholics Anonymous states, “brings about a personality change sufficient to bring about recovery from alcoholism”. The 12 steps are almost always read at meetings and are talked about in lead and discussion meetings. The 12 Steps are frequently a topic of discussion before and after meetings.

We are less acquainted with the 12 Traditions though they are principles paramount to our unity. In the forward of the 12 Steps and 12 Traditions it states “A.A.’s Twelve Traditions apply to the life of the Fellowship itself. They outline the means by which A.A. maintains its unity and relates itself to the world about it, the way it lives and grows”. The 12 Traditions are about Unity, Self-Support and Anonymity. In addition the practical application of these Principles should bring about a certain amount of humility. The Twelve Traditions are usually read at meetings. They are sometimes the topic of discussion at meetings and sometimes mentioned in leads. For some reason less emphasis is placed on the 12 Traditions as compared to the 12 Steps. Perhaps it is because they are not very prominent in the first 164 pages of our Big Book. The 12 and 12 states “We are sure that humility, expressed by anonymity, is the greatest safeguard that Alcoholics Anonymous can ever have.”

We are hardly acquainted with the 12 Concepts of World Service which are the principles which Bill states “will prove to be a reliable working guide in the years that lie ahead”. The Twelve Concepts guide us in regards to General Service, which involves all of A.A. The A.A. Groups, Group G.S.R.s, Districts, D.C.M.s, Area Assemblies, Delegates, Panel and Committee members, the General Service Conference, the General Service Board, Conference and Trustee Committees and the A.A. World Services and Grapevine Boards all use the 12 Concepts. These principles are essential to our whole organization. They are our life blood yet the 12 Concepts are rarely read at meetings. They are rarely the topic for discussion or talked about in Leads.

Amazingly the first concept states: Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. World Services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole fellowship... A.A. belongs to the members of Alcoholics Anonymous. We have been given the structure and principles to guide us in this endeavor. Sadly few of our Groups and members are involved in the structure of Alcoholics Anonymous. There is no voice for the Group without involvement. Involvement begins with a Group Service Representative (G.S.R.).
